EMERGENCY COMMUNICATION

If used in an emergency communication application, the 8036 SIP Multimedia Intercom should be routinely tested. SNMP supervision is recommended for assurance of proper operation. Contact Algo for other methods of operational assurance including the use of the integrated microphone for automated "sound to air" acoustic testing.

WET OR OUTDOOR ENVIRONMENTS

The 8036 SIP Multimedia Intercom is intended for indoor or outdoor locations and may be subjected to spray or weather, provided the rear wiring cavity is properly sealed to prevent water ingress.

Gaskets included with the 8036 SIP Multimedia Intercom may be effective against water ingress on some, but not all surfaces in which case additional protective measures must be taken such as a perimeter sealant.

CAT5 or CAT6 connection wiring to an IEEE 802.3af compliant network PoE switch must not leave the building perimeter without adequate lightning protection.

When the Intercom is connected to wiring that exits the building, there is potential risk of lightning induced electrical surges or high voltages from fault conditions. To reduce risk, outdoor wiring should be protected by Earth grounded conduit whenever possible. Relay input and output connections must not leave the building perimeter without adequate lightning protection.

About the Algo 8036 SIP Multimedia Intercom

The 8036 is a multimedia SIP endpoint from Algo combining the functionality of an IP phone, security camera, and interactive kiosk. Easily configurable to support multiple applications and interface configurations, the product is designed for outdoor or public access locations to provide enhanced communication and support for guests and visitors.

The 8036 SIP Multimedia Intercom can be configured using central provisioning features or by accessing a web interface via browsers such as Google Chrome, Firefox, or Internet Explorer.

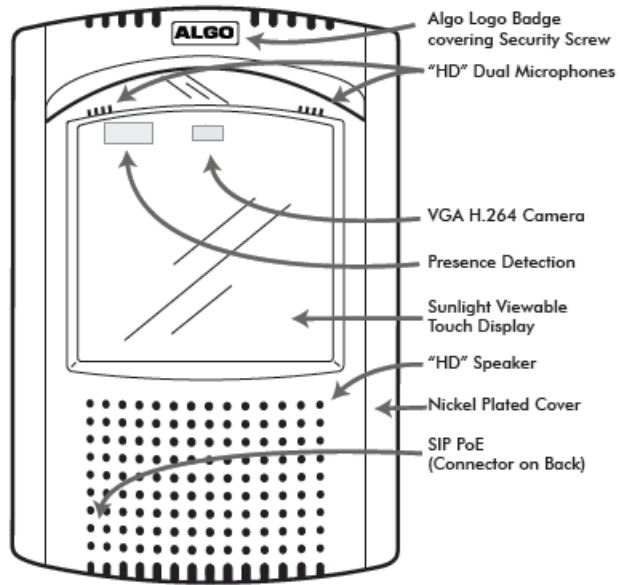

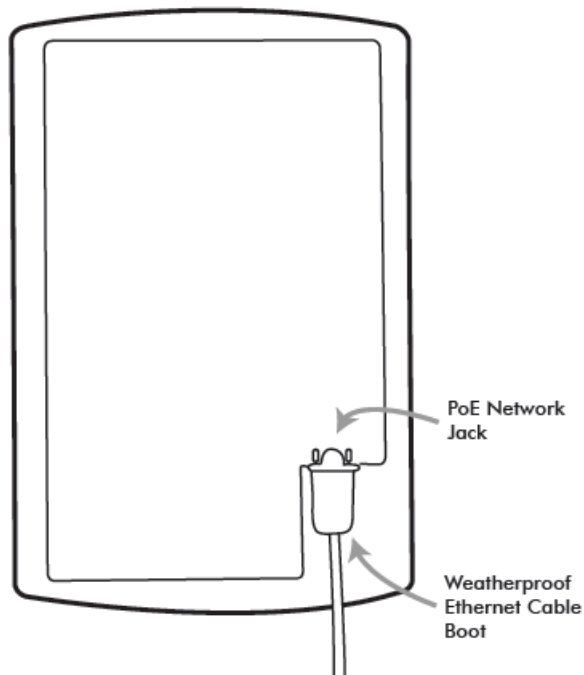

Getting Started - Quick Install & Test



This guide provides important safety information which should be read thoroughly before permanently installing the Intercom.

1. Connect the 8036 SIP Multimedia Intercom to an IEEE 802.3af compliant PoE network switch. The LCD screen will turn on and the 8036 will display the IP address on the screen. If the 8036 is unable to obtain an IP address from the DHCP server, it will default to the fixed IP address 192.168.1.111. The IP address may also be discovered by downloading the Algo locator tool to find Algo devices on your network: www.algosolutions.com/locator
2. Access the 8036 SIP Multimedia Intercom web page by entering the IP address into a browser (Chrome, IE, Firefox, etc.) and login using the default password **algo**.
3. Enter the IP address for the SIP server into the SIP Domain field under the **BASIC SETTINGS > SIP** tab.
4. Enter the page SIP Extension, Authentication ID, and Password.
Note: The Authentication ID may also be called Username for some SIP servers, and in some cases may be the same as the SIP extension.
5. For basic testing, create a UI test screen with a Call Button:
 - a. In the **User Interface > General** tab select 1 for the "Number of Active Pages" and click "Save" at the bottom right corner, to see the new "Page 1" appear in the tabs area. The 8036 screen should also now display a default image of a sky with clouds.
 - b. Proceed to the new "Page 1" tab and choose the "Button" template.
 - c. Choose "Single Button" for the "Button Layout" field.
 - d. Give the new Button 1 a name in the "Text" field (e.g. "Dial and Extension"). Pick the "Call" action for Button 1 and enter the extension you would like to dial from the intercom.
 - e. After saving the page, the new button should appear on the 8036 screen.
6. Press the Call Button on the 8036 Intercom screen, then answer the phone to talk over the Intercom.

Installation

This section will guide you with the physical installation of your new 8036 SIP Multimedia Intercom.

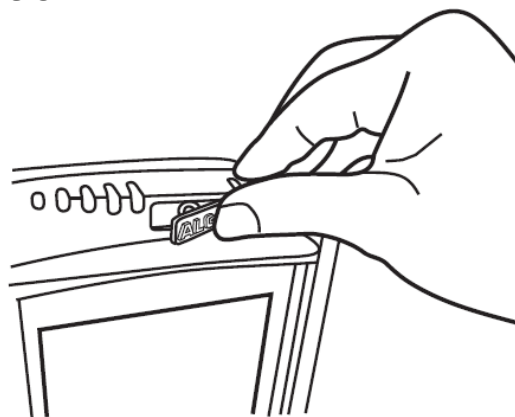
Wall Mounting

The 8036 can be either surface or flush mounted. The unit is designed to shed rainwater and allow air ventilation only when oriented in the correct position (ALGO logo at top) and installed vertically.

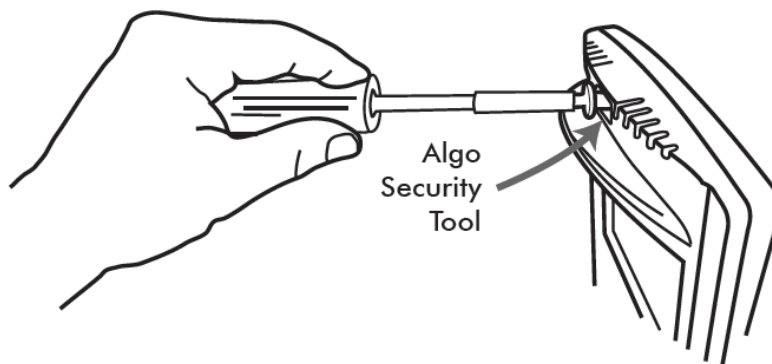
Removal of Front Bezel for Installation

The 8036 is shipped partially assembled and must be partially disassembled before it can be installed.

Remove the security screw behind the ALGO Logo Badge by first pressing on one side of the badge. This will raise the other side so that it can be removed easily by hand.



A security bit ("Algo Security Tool") is included with the 8036 that fits standard socket screwdrivers. Use the bit in a screwdriver to remove the security screw and carefully remove the Front Bezel by pulling at the top and then disengaging the bottom clip.



Put the Front Bezel, Security Screw, and Logo Badge aside for re-assembly after mounting.

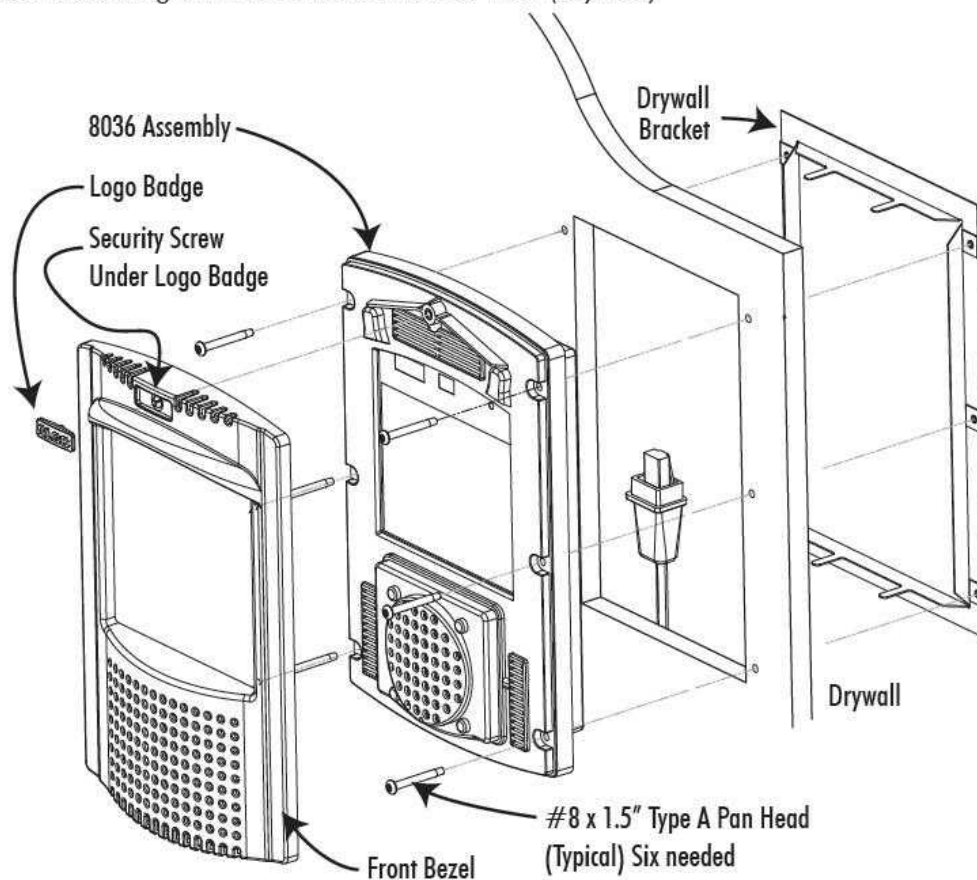
Refer to the following diagrams for the appropriate methods and components to use for different mounting applications.

Flush Mounting into Drywall (Interior)

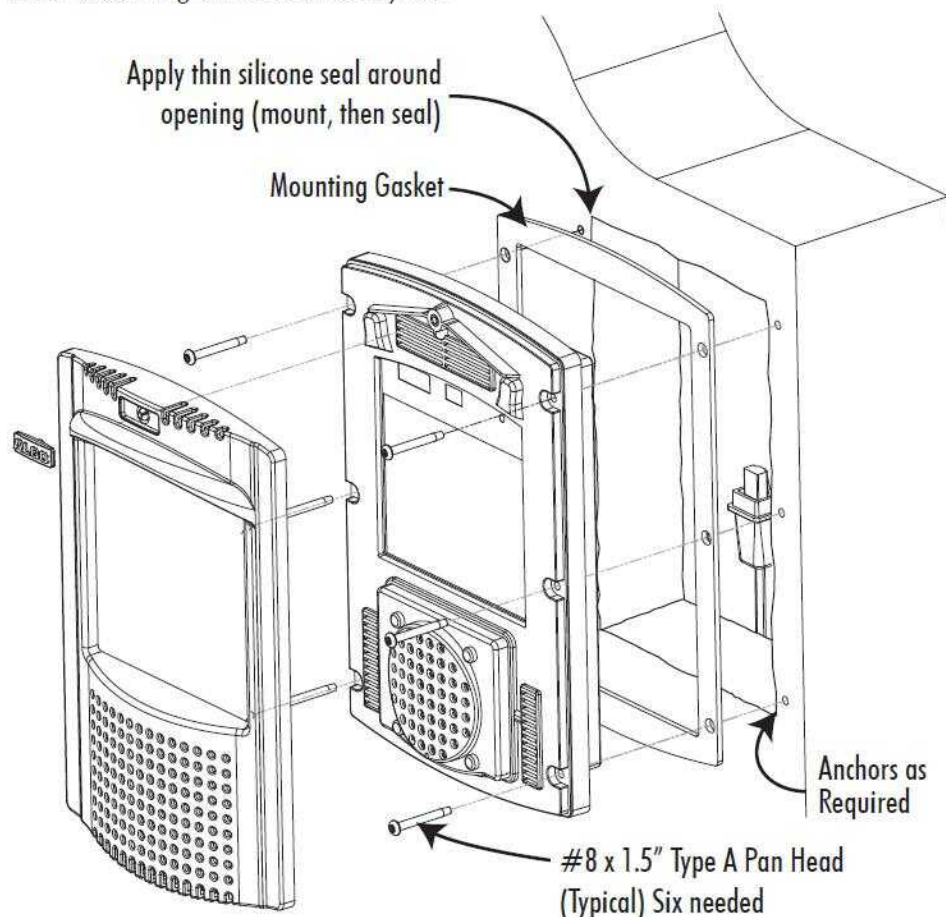
1. Create a drywall cut out. The template that can be downloaded at: www.algosolutions.com/8036mounting
2. Place the Drywall Bracket into wall and bend tabs around to the front of the drywall to hold in place.
3. After connecting the Ethernet cable, use the #8 x 1.5" Type A Pan Head screws to secure the 8036 housing to the Drywall Bracket.
4. Replace the Front Bezel and keep the Algo Security Tool in a safe location.
5. Replace the ALGO Logo Badge.

Note: The Mounting Gasket and Surface Mount Bracket are not required for drywall mounting.

Surface Mounting

The Surface Mount Bracket may be used on a wall surface where flush mounting is undesirable, or not practical. The bracket also may be good option when integrating the 8036 into stonework.

1. Mount the Surface Mount Bracket using the #8 x 1.5" Type A Pan Head screws supplied. For some wall materials, #8 anchors may be required (not included).

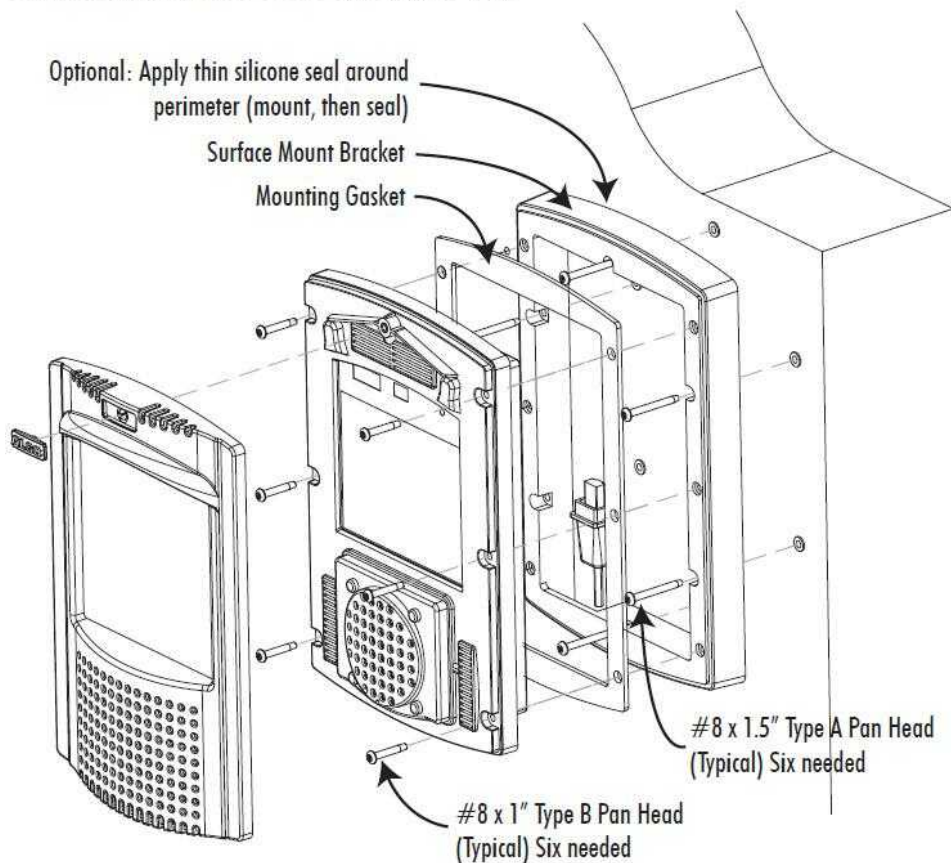
If outdoors:

- a. Ensure any opening in the wall is sealed or apply a silicon bead between the Surface Mount Bracket and wall surface around the outside perimeter.

- b. The Ethernet Cable Boot is to be placed over the network cable prior to terminating with a plug (see "PoE Network Connection" on page 15).
 - c. To prevent water from getting behind the 8036, place the Mounting Gasket on to the 8036 housing prior to mounting.
 2. After connecting the Ethernet cable, use the #8 x 1" Type B Pan Head screws to secure the 8036 housing to the Surface Mount Bracket.
 3. Replace the Front Bezel and keep the Algo Security Tool in a safe location. Replace the ALGO Logo Badge.

Note: The Drywall Bracket is not required when surface mounting.

Surface mounting an 8036 on outside wall



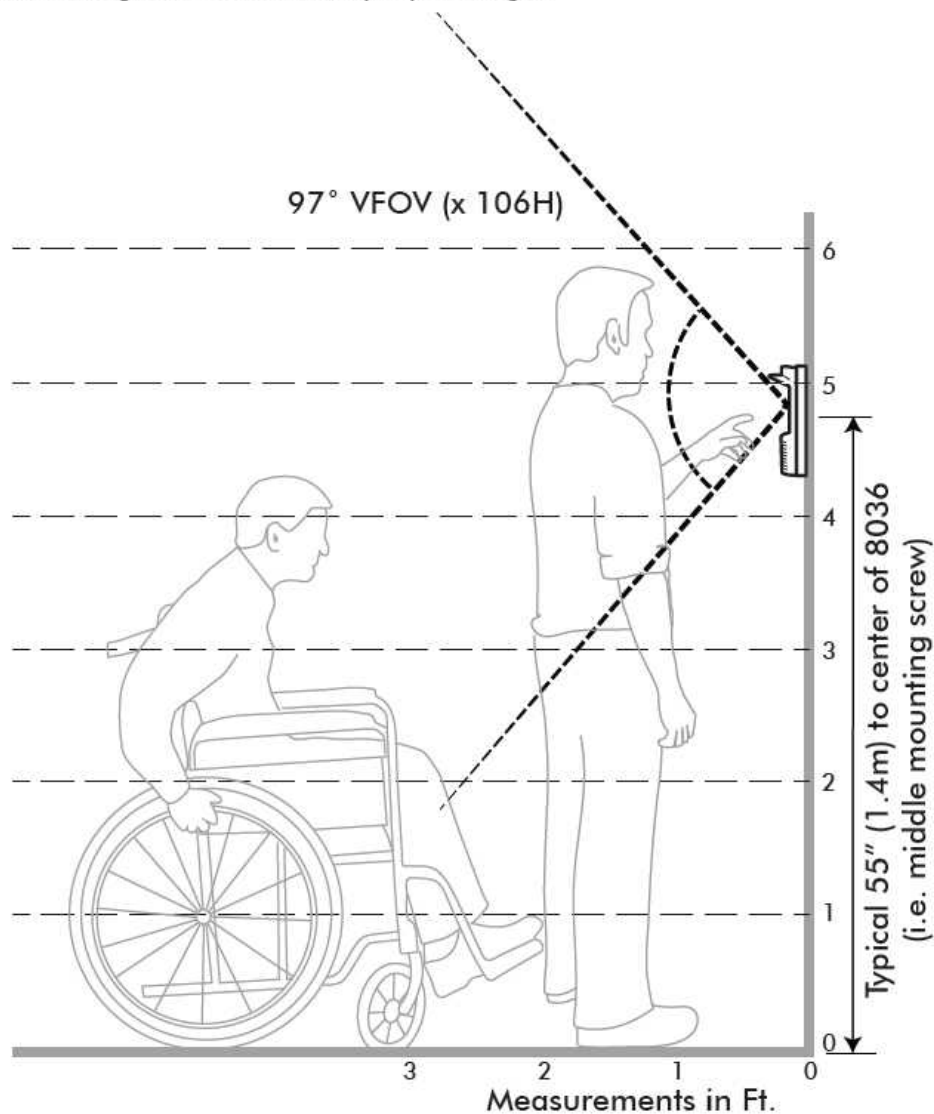
Mounting Height

The 8036 should be mounted at an appropriate height for your intended application. The considerations are:

1. Easy readability of the interface screens for users of different heights.
2. Highest quality camera and video images.

For most applications, a mounting height of approximately 55 inches (1.4 m) from floor to center of display is recommended.

Mounting the 8036 at the proper height

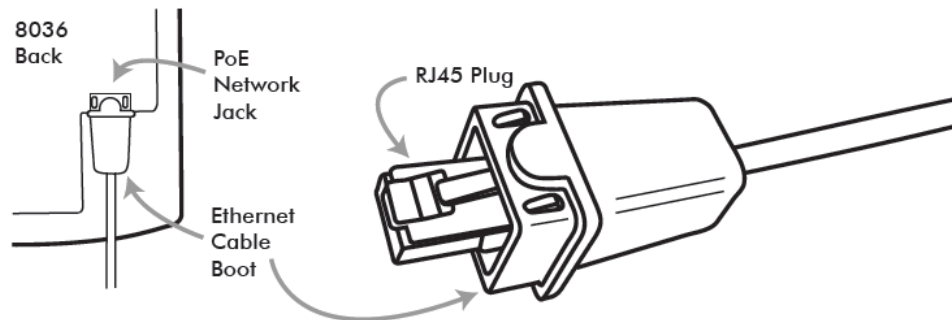


PoE Network Connection

The 8036 is powered by the Ethernet PoE network connection. Typically a network cable is run to the 8036 location and then terminated with a male RJ45 plug.

If you don't have a PoE switch, you'll need a PoE injector that installs between the 8036 and the network switch. The PoE injector will supply 48 Vdc to the 8036. Ensure that the PoE injector is fully compliant to the IEEE 802.3af standard.

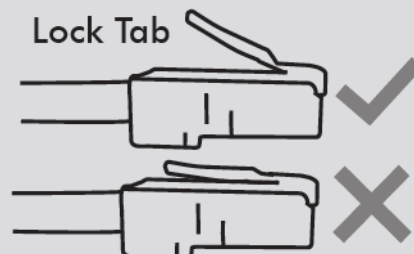
If mounting outdoors, slide the Ethernet Cable Boot onto the cable before installing the RJ45 plug.



After inserting the plug into the 8036 jack, carefully position the boot into the jack cavity to prevent moisture or insects from getting inside.



When inserting the plug into the jack, be sure the plug lock tab is not accidentally depressed, creating a loose connection.



Web Interface

Primary configuration of the 8036 is through the web interface control panel. Here is where you will be able to set up your 8036 and also develop interface screens to create interactive applications.

Accessing the Control Panel

To access the 8036 Control Panel, your first need to determine the 8036's IP address and then enter this address into a browser.

Finding the IP Address

After connecting the 8036 to a network PoE port, the 8036 will attempt to obtain an IP address from the DHCP server and display this on the screen.



If this is the first time you are using the 8036 and no user interface has yet been set up, you will be displayed the Welcome screen to the right which provides the IP address. If a User Interface already exists, the IP address will be shown for a few seconds at boot time, before the splash screen appears.

If the 8036 is unable to obtain an IP address from the DHCP server, it will default to the fixed IP address 192.168.1.111.

The IP address may be discovered by downloading the Algo locator tool to find Algo devices on your network:

www.algosolutions.com/locator

Enter the IP address (eg. 192.168.1.111) into a browser such as Google Chrome, Firefox, or Internet Explorer (other than IE9). The web interface should be visible and the default password will be **algo** in lower case letters.

Application Development

Overview

With the 8036 you can easily design, implement, and update custom user interface screens and functions that help you communicate most effectively with visitors and guests. For example, you can make attractive landing pages with your company logo and graphics. On it, you can have buttons that make calls or that lead to various information or directory pages.



Example 8036 Custom Graphics Screen using 3x3 Full Button layout with three active buttons.

You can set all of this up using the 8036 Control Panel. You'll also be able to back up all the configuration and user interface information to a PC for safekeeping.

Creating User Interface Screens

The key to an effective implementation of the 8036 is to configure a package of interface screens that fulfill the various visitor functions you require. You do this easily through the "User Interface" menu in the 8036 Control Panel (see "User Interface" on page [36](#)).

For a basic implementation, you can set up simple screens and pages using the generic button graphics and background screens provided with the system. You can also easily create graphics screens with standard image editing programs and then import them into the 8036. Either way, you can set up multiple pages with different button configurations and layouts, enable or disable specific button locations, and set different actions associated with each button.

You can also import tab-delimited text files containing names and numbers and have the 8036 display a directory whereby visitors can call individuals directly.

Custom Graphic Screens

To develop custom interface screens you need to be able to create 640 x 480 pixel graphic files in the PNG, GIF, and JPEG formats. Most graphics/image editing programs (such as Adobe® Photoshop®) have this capability. Within the graphics program you can create your own background and button graphics and then align the button graphics (if used) to the layouts you have chosen for your 8036 User Interface. Photoshop button layout templates are available for download at www.algosolutions.com/8036templates. For more information see page [39](#).

Directory (Addressbook) Listings

You can also upload tab-delimited text files to allow the 8036 to display directory pages. You can then set up pages to use these directory files to display a call directory for visitors to use. For more information see page [43](#).

Uploading user content

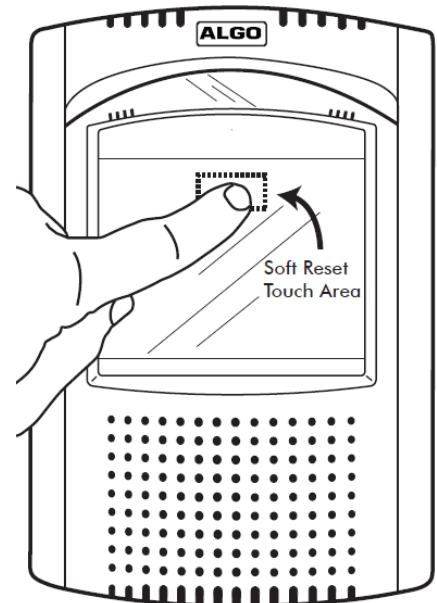
Before configuring a custom user interface, all the images, directory text files, and other resources that will be used by your UI must first be uploaded to the 8036. For information about uploading files, see the File Manager information on page [45](#).

Reset

A soft reset of your 8036 may be necessary if, for example, the administrative password has been changed and then forgotten.

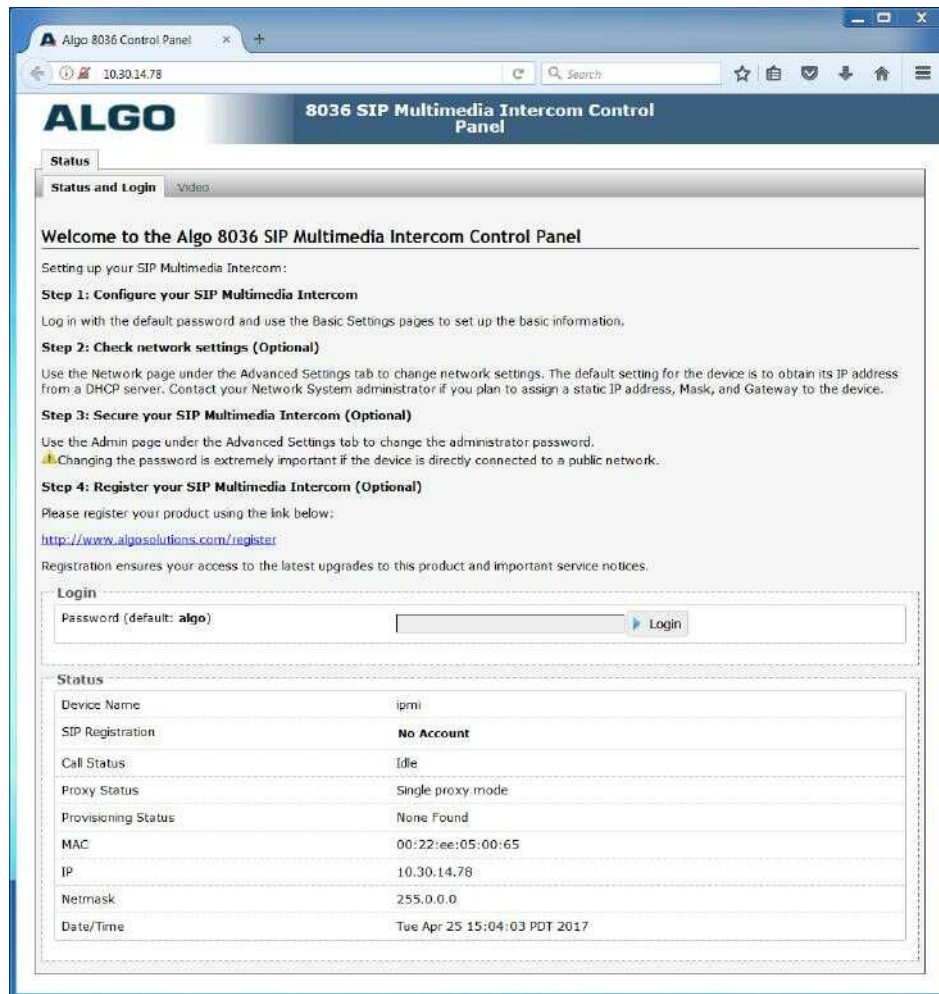
To do a soft reset:

1. Disconnect the network cable from the 8036 and reconnect it again.
2. Press the words "**Algo 8036 Firmware: 1.5.1**" within five seconds of their appearance in the top middle section of the screen (see right). A confirmation button will appear in the bottom middle area with the text description "**Press here to reset to factory default.**"
3. Press this confirmation button within five seconds, and the unit will reset itself back to factory default settings.



Web Interface Login

The web interface requires a password which is "**algo**" by default. This password can be changed using the *Admin* tab after logging in the first time.

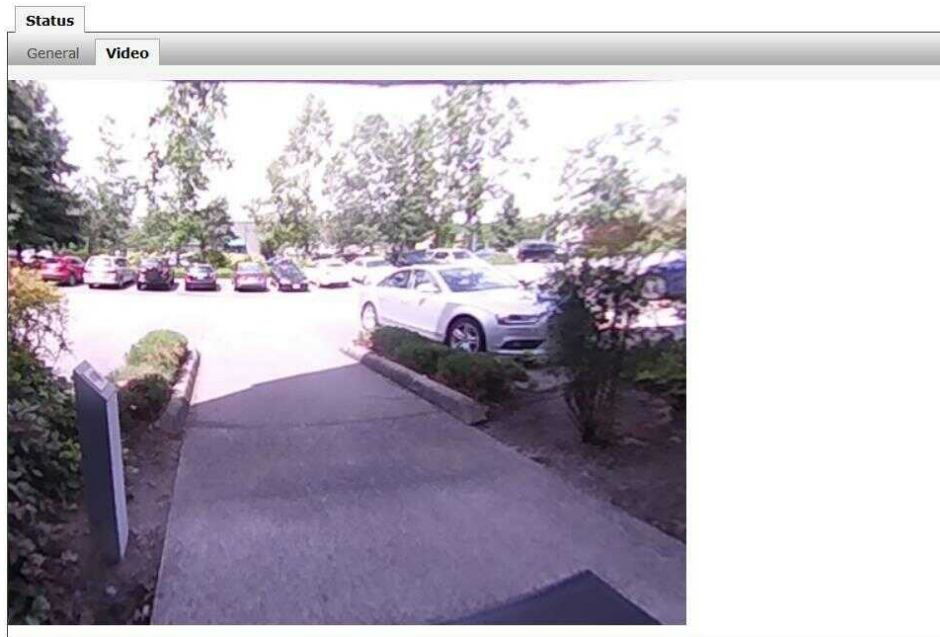


Status

The device's Status page will be available before and after log on. The section can be used to check 8036's SIP Registration status of the SIP extension, Call Status, Proxy Status, and general MAC, IP, Netmask, Date/Time information.

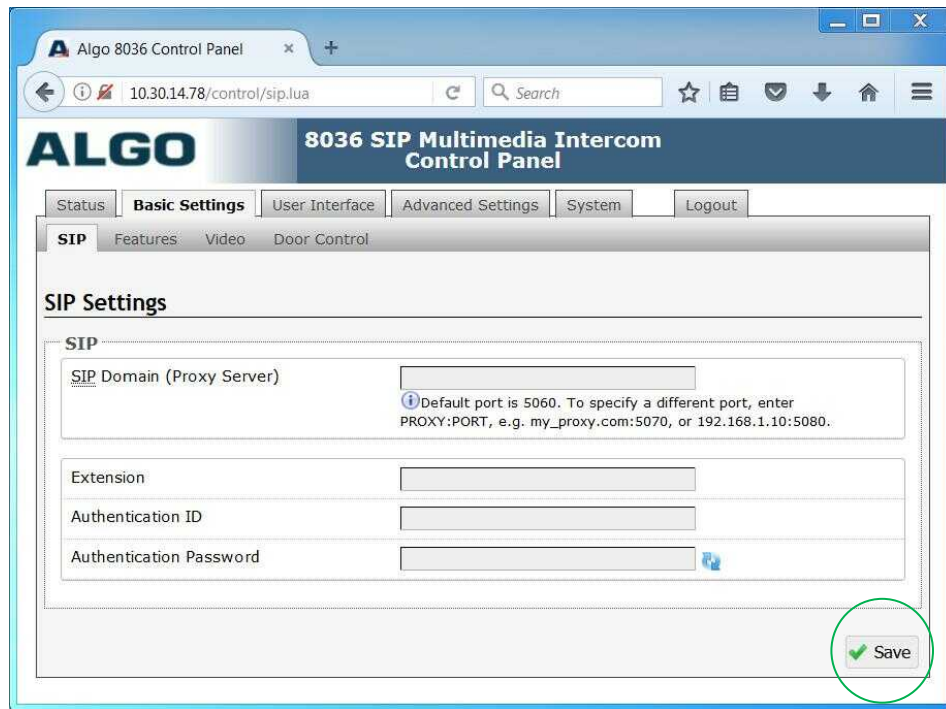
Status Tab – Video

The video can be seen in the "Status > Video" tab when the user is not logged in. A separate video password can also be enabled, to allow users to access the video, but not the rest of the device settings. This password can be set in "Basic Settings > Video" tab, "Session Passcode" field. Video settings like brightness, contrast are also available in the "Basic Settings > Video" tab.



Basic Settings Tab – SIP

SIP Server information and Credentials should be obtained from your telephone system administrator or hosted account provider. After saving the settings, see the Status tab to confirm the registration was successful.



Note: Any time changes are made to settings in the Web Interface the "Save" key must be clicked to save the changes

SIP Domain (Proxy Server)

SIP Server Name or IP Address

Extension

Used to register the 8036 on the SIP Server.

Authentication ID

May also be called Username for some SIP servers, and in some cases may be the same as the SIP extension.

Authentication Password

SIP password provided by the system administrator for the SIP extension.

Basic Settings Tab – Features

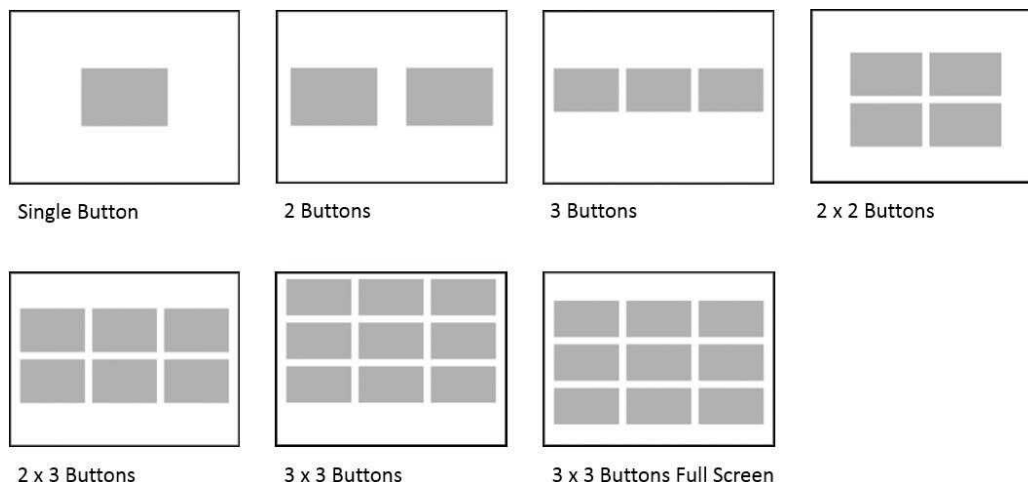

Back Button

Adds a Back button to the lower left of the screen. Clicking it will return the user to the previously displayed screen. The Back button can be enabled or disabled.

Home Button

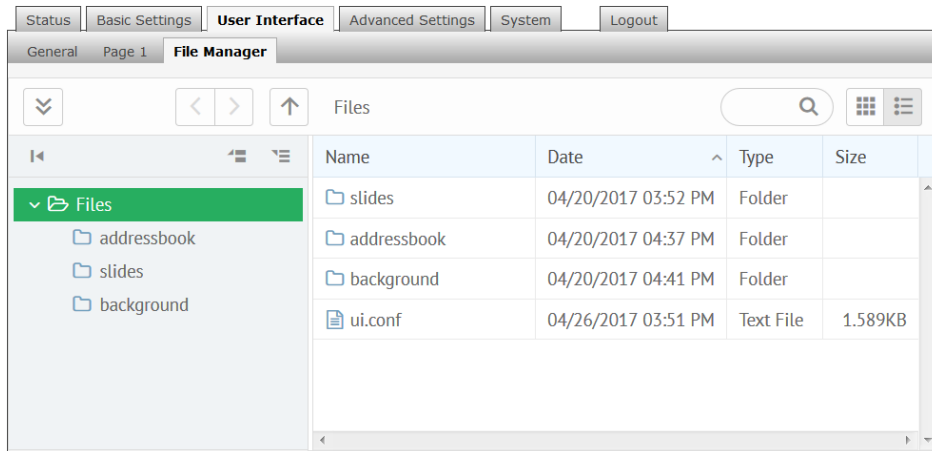

To create a tab delimited text file using Microsoft Excel:

1. Open your spreadsheet document go to the Windows/Office round button menu and choose Save As...
2. Change the "Save as type" or "Format" field to read: 'Text (Tab delimited)'.
3. Enter a name for the document and click Save.

The Addressbook entries should be sorted before upload to the 8036, as the device will not sort the entries in the file.

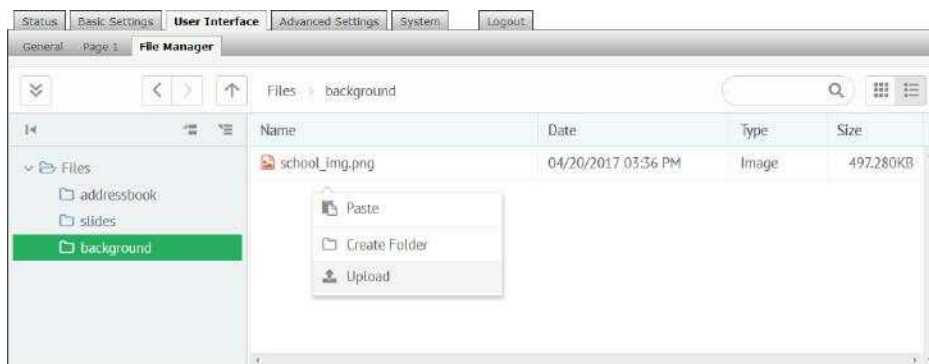

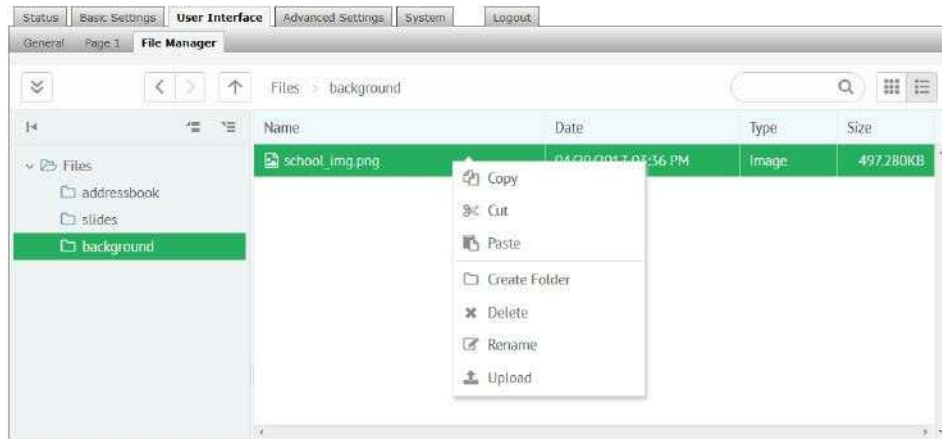
Tab-delimited text files should be uploaded to the “addressbook” folder for directory entries (page 43). Images can be uploaded to either the “slides” folder, for slideshow displays (page 37), or “background” folder, for custom background screens (page 39). For best appearance on the screen, the image files should be 640 x 480 pixels, 16 bit high color, and in PNG, JPEG, or GIF format.

Note: the 8036 UI may need to be rebooted (in System > Maintenance tab) after uploading certain files (e.g. slides) in order for them to be visible on the screen.



To upload a file, right-click in the appropriate folder for the menu to appear and select "upload" or "paste" if you are copying the file from another folder.

Multiple files can be uploaded simultaneously by holding the "Ctrl" or "Shift" key when selecting the desired files in the file viewer window.



To delete, rename, cut/copy an existing file, right-click on the file of choice.

Protocol

DHCP is an IP standard designed to make administration of IP addresses simpler. When selected, DHCP will automatically configure IP addresses for each 8036 SIP Multimedia Intercom on the network. Alternatively the 8036 SIP Multimedia Intercom can be set to a static IP address.

VLAN Mode

Enables or Disables VLAN Tagging. VLAN Tagging is the networking standard that supports Virtual LANs (VLANs) on an Ethernet network. The standard defines a system of VLAN tagging for Ethernet frames and the accompanying procedures to be used by bridges and switches in handling such frames. The standard also provides provisions for a quality of service prioritization scheme commonly

known as IEEE 802.1p and defines the Generic Attribute Registration Protocol.

VLAN ID

Specifies the VLAN to which the Ethernet frame belongs. A 12-bit field specifying the VLAN to which the Ethernet frame belongs. The hexadecimal values of 0x000 and 0xFF F are reserved. All other values may be used as VLAN identifiers, allowing up to 4094 VLANs. The reserved value 0x000 indicates that the frame does not belong to any VLAN; in this case, the 802.1Q tag specifies only a priority and is referred to as a priority tag. On bridges, VLAN 1 (the default VLAN ID) is often reserved for a management VLAN; this is vendor specific.

VLAN Priority

Sets the frame priority level. Otherwise known as Priority Code Point (PCP), VLAN Priority is a 3-bit field which refers to the IEEE 802.1p priority. It indicates the frame priority level. Values are from 0 (lowest) to 7 (highest).

Differentiated Services (6-bit DSCP value)

Provides quality of service if the DSCP protocol is supported on your network. Can be specified independently for SIP control packets versus RTP audio packets.

Password

Password to log into the 8036 SIP Multimedia Intercom web interface. You should change the default password **algo** in order to secure the device on the network. If you have forgotten your password, you will need to perform a reset using the Reset Button in order to restore the password (as well as all other settings) back to the original factory default conditions.

A tone can be played at startup to confirm that the device has booted.

Use on the advice of Algo technical support only.

Log Method

Allows the 8036 SIP Multimedia Intercom to write to external Syslog server if the option for external (or both) is selected.

Log Server

If "Network" or "Both" is selected this is the address of the Syslog server on the network.

Web Interface Protocol

HTTPS is always enabled on the device. Use this setting to disable HTTP. When HTTP is disabled, requests will be automatically redirected to HTTPS. Also note that since the device can have any address on the local network, no security certificate exists, and thus most browsers will provide a warning when using HTTPS.

Force Strong Password

When enabled, ensures that a secure password is provided for the device's web interface for additional protection. The password requirements are:

- Must contain at least 10 characters
- Must contain at least 1 uppercase character
- Must contain at least 1 digit (0 – 9)
- Must contain at least 1 special character

Allow Secure SIP Password

Allows SIP passwords to be stored in the configuration file in an encrypted format, to prevent viewing and recovery. Once enabled, the SIP "Realm" field should be entered and all the configured Authentication Password(s) must be re-entered in the Basic Settings > SIP tab, and any other locations where SIP extension have been configured, to save the encrypted password(s).

If the Realm is changed at a later time, all the passwords will also need to be re-entered again to save the passwords with the new encryption.

To obtain your SIP Realm information, contact your SIP Server administrator (or check the SIP log file for a registration attempt). The Realms may be the same or different for all the extensions used.

SNMP Support (v1 get only)

Additional SNMP support is anticipated for future, but the 8036 SIP Multimedia Intercom will respond to a simple status query for automated supervision. Contact Algo technical support for more information.

When "Use DHCP Option 42" is chosen, if an NTP Server address is provided via the DHCP Option 42, that NTP Server will be used instead of the 4 mentioned above. Alternatively, "Ignore DHCP Option 42" can be chosen to only use servers mentioned above.

Device Date/Time

This field shows the current time and date as set on the device. If testing the device on a lab network that may not have access to an

external NTP server, the "Sync with browser" button can be used to temporarily set the time on the device.

Note, this time value will be lost at power down, or overwritten if NTP is currently active. Time and date are used only for logging purposes and for the Scheduler.

Provisioning allows installers to pre-configure 8036 SIP Multimedia Intercom units prior to installation on a network. It is typically used for large deployments to save time and ensure consistent setups.

Note: only the SIP and Network-related settings can be uploaded via Provisioning. The User Interface cannot be auto-provisioned at this time.

The device can be provisioned via the Auto mode (where all three DHCP options (Option 66/160/150) will be automatically checked for an active provisioning server), just one of the three specified DHCP options, or a Static Server. In addition, there are four different ways to download provisioning files from a "Provisioning Server": TFTP (Trivial File Transfer Protocol), FTP, HTTP, or HTTPS.

For example, 8036 configuration files can be automatically downloaded from a TFTP server using DHCP Option 66. This option code (when set) supplies a TFTP boot server address to the DHCP client to boot from.

DHCP must be enabled if using DHCP Option 66/160/150, in order for Provisioning to work.

One of two files can be uploaded on the Provisioning Server (for access via TFTP, FTP, HTTP, or HTTPS):

Generic (for all 8036 SIP Multimedia Intercoms)	algot8036.conf
Specific (for a specific MAC address)	algot[MAC].conf

Both protocol and path is supported for Option 66, allowing for <http://myserver.com/config-path> to be used.

MD5 Checksum

In addition to the .conf file, an .md5 checksum file must also be uploaded to the Provisioning server. This checksum file is used to verify that the .conf file is transferred correctly without error.

A tool such as can be found at the website address below may be used to generate this file:

The application doesn't need an installation. To use the tool, simply unzip and run the application (md5) from a command prompt. The proper .md5 file will be generated in the same directory.

If using the above tool, be sure to use the "-l" parameter to generate lower case letters.

Generating a generic configuration file

1. Connect 8036 to the network
2. Access the 8036 Web Interface Control Panel
3. Configure the 8036 with desired options
4. Click on the System tab and then Maintenance.
5. Click "Download" to download the current configuration file
6. Save the file settings.txt
7. Rename file settings.txt to algot8036.conf
8. File algot8036.conf can now be uploaded onto the Provisioning server

If using a generic configuration file, extensions and credentials have to be entered manually once the 8036 SIP Multimedia Intercom has automatically downloaded the configuration file.

Generating a specific configuration file

Follow steps 1 to 6 as listed in the section "Generating a generic configuration file".

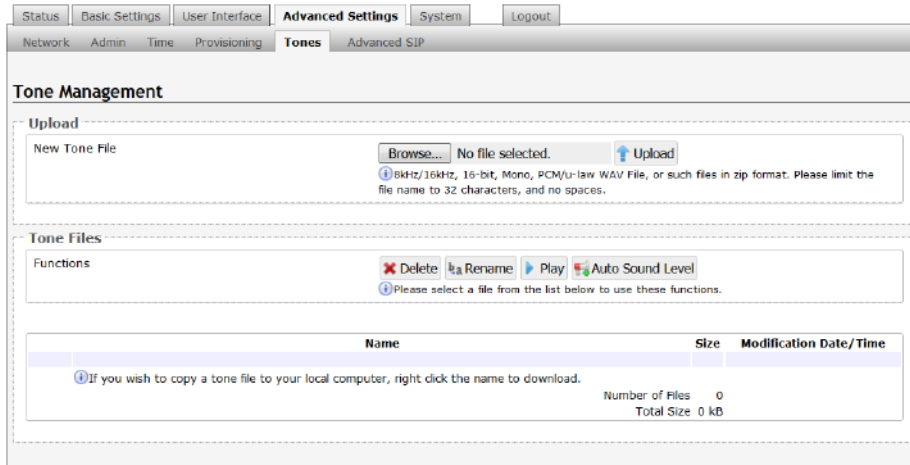
1. Rename file settings.txt to algom[MAC address].conf (e.g. algom0022EE020009.conf)
2. File algom[MAC address].conf can now be uploaded on the Provisioning server.

The specific configuration file will only be downloaded by the 8036 SIP Multimedia Intercom with the MAC address specified in the configuration file name. Since all the necessary settings can be included in this file, the 8036 will be ready to work immediately after the configuration file is downloaded. The MAC address of each 8036 SIP Multimedia Intercom can be found on the back label of the unit.

Uploading Custom Audio Files

Custom audio files (WAV format) may be uploaded into memory (1 GB) to play for notification applications.

An existing file may also be modified by downloading the original via the links in the web interface, making the desired changes, and then uploading the new version with a different name. Audio files must be in the following format:

- WAV format
- 8kHz or 16kHz sampling rate
- 16-bit PCM, or u-law
- Mono

A zip files containing one or more audio files may also be uploaded. File names must be limited to 32 characters, with no spaces.

Outbound Proxy

IP address for outbound proxy. A proxy (server) stands between a private network and the internet.

STUN Server

IP address for STUN server if present.

Register Period (seconds)

Maximum requested period of time where the 8036 SIP Multimedia Intercom will re-register with the SIP server. Default setting is 3600 seconds (1 hour). Only change if instructed otherwise.

Keep-alive Method

If Double CRLF is selected the 8036 SIP Multimedia Intercom will send a packet every 30 seconds (unless changed) to maintain connection with the SIP Server if behind NAT.

Server Redundancy Feature

Two secondary SIP servers may be configured. The 8036 SIP Multimedia Intercom will attempt to register with the primary server but switch to a secondary server when necessary. The configuration allows re-registration to the primary server upon availability or to stay with a server until unresponsive.

If Server Redundancy is selected the web page will expand as shown below.

Backup Server #1

If primary server is unreachable the 8036 SIP Multimedia Intercom will attempt to register with the backup servers. If enabled, the 8036 SIP Multimedia Intercom will always attempt to register with the highest priority server.

Backup Server #2

If backup server #1 is unreachable the 8036 SIP Multimedia Intercom will attempt to register with the 2nd backup server. If enabled, the 8036 SIP Multimedia Intercom will always attempt to register with the highest priority server.

Polling Intervals (seconds)

Time period between sending monitoring packets to each server. Non-active servers are always polled, and active server may optionally be polled (see below).

Poll Active Server

Explicitly poll current server to monitor availability. May also be handled automatically by other regular events, so can be disabled to reduce network traffic.

Automatic Failback

Reconnect with higher priority server once available, even if backup connection is still fine.

Polling Method

SIP message used to poll servers to monitor availability.

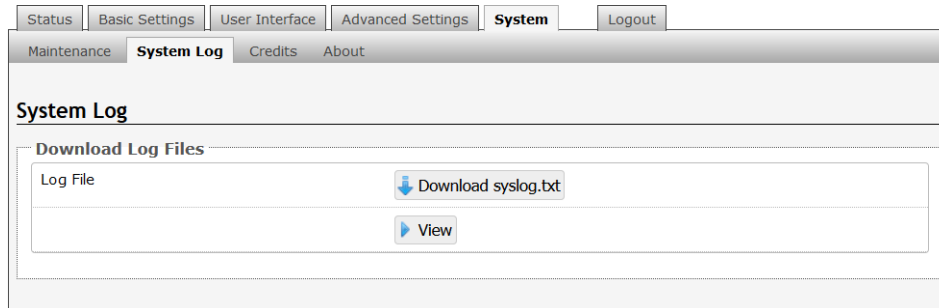

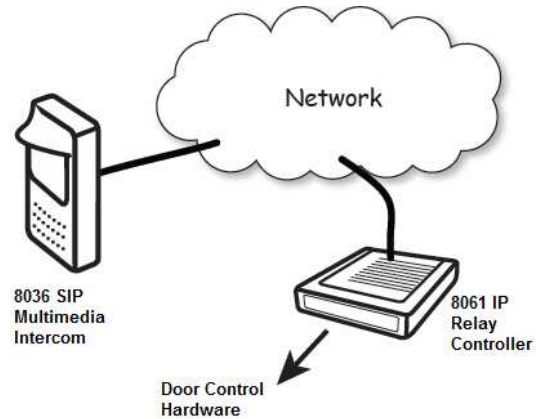
8061 IP Relay Controller

The 8036 can provide door control functionality when used with the optional Algo 8061 IP Relay Controller.

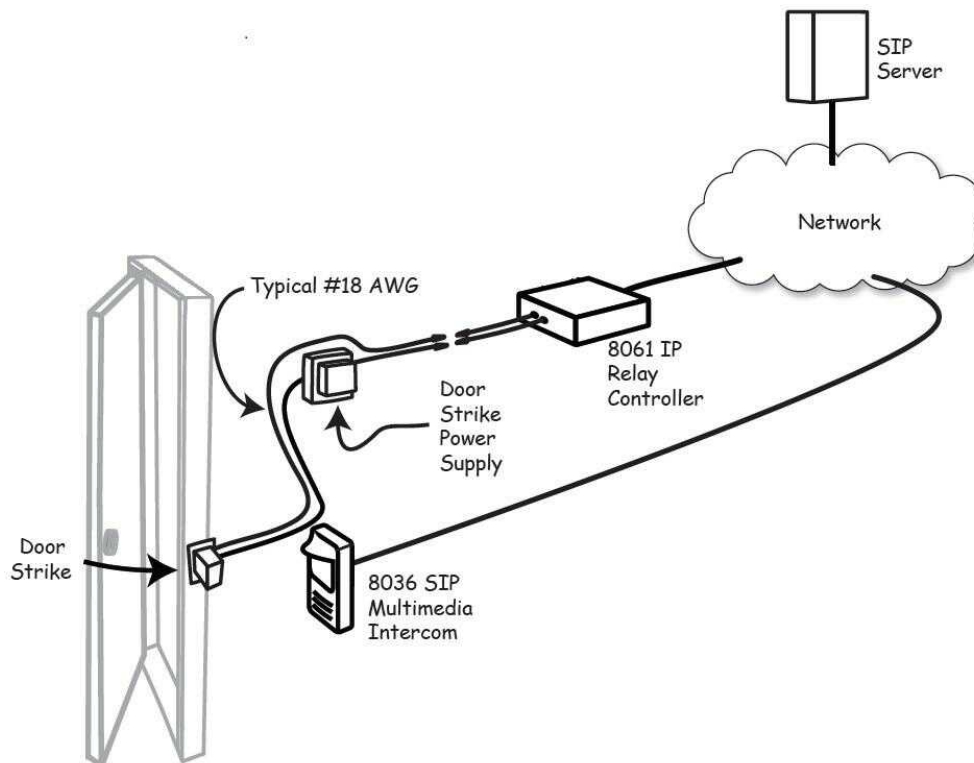
The 8061 serves as a bridge between the 8036 and peripheral hardware such as door strike.

As a door opening controller, the 8061 can be located in a secure environment to prevent tampering of the public-facing intercom.

The door control feature is activated by a command from the answering telephone keypad, or entry of the door release code by a visitor via the 8036 itself.

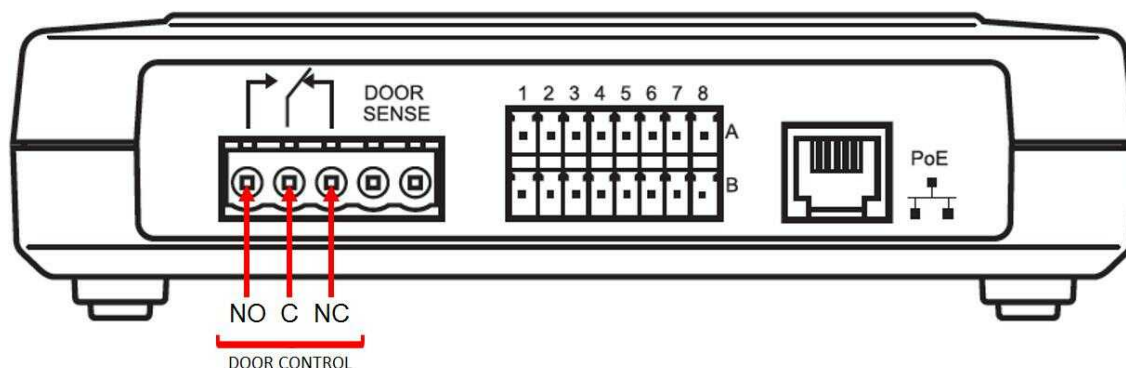


Typical 8036/8061 Setup



PoE and Relay Connections on back of 8061 IP Relay Controller:

1. Connect the 8061 to the network via an Ethernet cable at the back of the device. Ensure that a PoE port is used for power and that the 8061 is connected to the same subnet and VLAN as the target intercom.
2. Run two wires from the door strike to the Normally Open/Common (NO/C) input pair or Common/Normally Closer (C/NC) input pair on the 8061. For more wiring information please visit: www.algosolutions.com/doorstrike.
